DISCUSSION QUESTIONS: Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A (Anne Osdieck)

First Reading Isaiah 22:19-23

1. This reading, from Isaiah, says, "he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem." How can the Church act as father in the present crises: racial, immigration, environmental, martial? Besides continuing to have a solid faith, what other qualities or virtues do we look for in Church leadership?

Second Reading Romans 11:33-36

1. "For who has known the mind of the Lord?" Are you good at recognizing the Lord in your life? Are you able to know where God is leading you, or what God is doing in your life?

Gospel Matthew 16:13-20

- 1. To answer Jesus' question, "who do you say I am," you have to know him. Which of the following could help you know Jesus?—take whatever time you wish with any of these:
 - Music by Vivaldi; Michelangelo's David; Van Gogh's Irises; a good homily; a good book; good friends; suffering; joy; meditation; successes; weaknesses; family; flowers; people without a home.
 - Can you find (and get to know) God in many of these [and more]?
- 2. When the disciples answered Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am?" they went from admiring Jesus to following him. What do you think Pope Francis meant when he said that in following Jesus we are "looking ahead and welcoming the kairos [moment of grace]"?
 - At Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asks his disciples: "Who do you say that I am?" ... They had to take that decisive step, from admiring Jesus to imitating Jesus. Today too, the Lord looks at each of us personally and asks: "Who am I for you?" This question, addressed to each of us, calls for more than a quick answer straight out of the catechism. It requires a vital, personal response.

That response renews us as disciples. It takes place in three steps, steps that the disciples took and that we too can take. It involves first, proclaiming Jesus; second, discerning with Jesus and third, following Jesus....

Twenty-first Sunday In Ordinary Time Year A

First Reading Isaiah 22:19-23

A reading from the prophet Isaiah I place the key of the House of David upon his shoulder.

Thus says the Lord of hosts to Shebna, the master of the palace: I dismiss you from your office, I remove you from your post and the same day I call on my servant Eliakim son *Matthew* of Hilkiah. I invest him with your robe, gird him with your sash, entrust him with your authority and he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem and to the House of Judah.

I place the key of the House of David on his shoulder; should he open, no one shall close, should he close, no one shall open. I drive him like a peg into a firm place; he will become a throne of glory for his father's house.
