Dear Parish family,

As priests we have to attend many seminars and conferences. Evangelisation is one subject that invariably finds its way in at every one of these meetings. This includes hours of discussions and deliberations on ways and means to reach out to people. Many of these discussions end up with more questions than answers.

Recently a piece from the newsletter of St. Patrick Catholic School Latrobe caught my attention. Here is what the School Principal Carmen Aylott wrote to parents and staff.

"Since we are all called to share in this "Bread of Life", anyone is welcome to attend Mass at a Roman Catholic Church, and if you so choose, take steps towards becoming a Catholic, even if you are not a Christian. Church attendance is both obligatory and beneficial; public worship allows everyone to come together to strengthen our faith and community. It helps you to lead a Christ centred life. When this happens, you may notice changes in your life. Many have experienced an unbelievable shifting of life circumstances, while others have found the strength and grace to move forward in spite of obstacles and struggles. Carmen through her gentle invitation is inviting staff and parents to come and see the beauty of the Eucharist which is central to her life and profession. When the invitation is personal and genuine, it opens up life changing opportunities for people.

As principal of a Catholic school, Carmen wasn't just representing her school in the parish but is participating in the life and ministry of the church, showing her staff and parents how each one of us can be an agent of evangelisation, a herald of the good news. Please remember to bring some loose change.




BINGO

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS: Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A (Anne Osdieck)

First Reading Jeremiah 20:7-9

Jeremiah couldn't ignore the call to prophecy even though it brought him much ridicule. Who today speaks out about injustice in areas like human trafficking, racial discrimination, gun violence, climate change, and death penalty?

Second Reading Romans 12:1-2

How do you discern God's will? Does certainty about the will of God's come suddenly? Can it emerge gradually? Do you imagine you have made the decision and then check for feelings of consolation or desolation?

Do you think Christ will use your suffering for the salvation of the world if you unite your trials with His?

Gospel Matthew 16:21-27

According to Pope Francis, if we want to be his disciples, how do we imitate Christ? Thus the task of "taking up the cross" becomes participating with Christ in the salvation of the world. Considering this, let us make sure that the cross hanging on the wall at home, or that little one that we wear around our neck, is a sign of our wish to be united with Christ in lovingly serving our brothers and sisters, especially the littlest and most fragile.

Each time we fix our gaze on the image of Christ crucified, let us contemplate that he, as the true Servant of the Lord, has accomplished his mission, giving life, spilling his blood for the pardoning of sins. Therefore, if we want to be his disciples, we are called to imitate him, expending our life unreservedly out of love of God and neighbour.

First Reading Jeremiah 20:7-9

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The word of the Lord God has meant derision for me.

You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger. I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt. Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!' The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long. I used to say, I will not think about him, I will not speak in his name any more. Then there seemed to be a fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones. The effort to restrain it wearied me,

I could not bear it.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 62:2-6. 8-9. R. v.2

(R.) My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

- 1. O God, you are my God, for you I long; for you my soul is thirsting. My body pines for you like a dry, weary land without water. (R.)


This is the only way to discover the will of God and know what is good, what it is that God wants, what is the perfect thing to do.
